Femicide:

Femicide is commonly defined as the intentional murder of women because they are women. OAITH's definition of femicide includes women (and at times their children) or girls who were killed by men who are either a former or current intimate partner, a family member, someone known to them, or in some cases unknown but still targeted.

Introduction:

Media reporting plays an important role in understanding and shaping public perceptions of social issues (Gillespie et al. 2013). Media sources have the ability to frame the dominant narrative through the use of various images and language, sources and substantive content. Whether or not the frame is accurate, these frames allow the general public and policymakers to easily categorize, label and manage issues. Media frames are often shaped by three components: sources, language and context (Gillespie et al. 2013, 225).

Research has found that femicide is often framed as episodic or isolated criminal events (Easteal et al., 2015). This is done through word choice, at times placing blame on the victim, through an over-reliance on criminal justice sources as well as a lack of contextualizing details such as victim-perpetrator relationship and a history of gender-based violence. As a result, femicide cases are often de-contextualized within the media and are portrayed as individualized incidents rather than a part of a social gendered problem (Gillespie et al., 2013). By framing these events as isolated incidents there is a focus on individual circumstances and responsibility and no connection is made to the role that patriarchy and gendered power relationships play as part of the root cause of male violence against women and femicide (Easteal et al., 2015). By excluding important facts concerning the reality of violence against women them journalists are contributing indirectly to



mythology (Easteal, Blatchford, Holland & Sutherland 2021). Such mythology reinforces and supports ideologies and institutions that uphold gender inequality.

In an effort to increase public understanding of the complexity of gender-based violence and to work toward addressing solutions there is a need to accurately situate femicide as a form of gender-based violence and not as an isolated incident.

The following document highlights a number of existing recommendations and best practices for media reporting on femicide that can be used to improve media reporting and public understanding of femicide and to contextualize femicide as the most extreme form of gender-based violence.

- crime
- No negative language to describe victim
- No sympathetic language to describe perpetrator
- Use correct terminology, name VAW as a crime, avoid euphemisms
- Avoid language that implies mutuality in the VAW, i.e. "domestic dispute"
- Recognize power of Headline and do not reinforce gender stereotypes/myths
- Use active language to reinforce perpetrator accountability & counter perpetrator excusing comments or descriptors of the perpetrator that imply that they are an exceptional deviation from the norm (i.e. "monster")

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Use Expert Sources

Consult gender-based violence advocates and choose survivors and/or survivor advocates as source & do not rely on "authorized knowers" traditional voices including police, cjs and state actors, court reports

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Avoid using sources of information who are distant acquaintances from the victim and/or perpetrator and are unlikely to know background and circumstances, do use close friends and family members
