She is the five times great-granddaughter of Chief Jean Baptist Assiginack, the keeper and great orator of the 1764 covenant chain wampum belt and her mother is a band member of the Sheshegwaning First Nation. Brenda travels throughout Southwestern Ontario spreading the Indigenous word through wampum belt workshops and land acknowledgements.

DOE O'BRIEN-TEENGS

Doe O'Brien-Teengs is an Omushkego Cree/ Irish Canadian Two Spirit storyteller, writer, Indigenous Knowledge Resource Teacher at the Royal Ontario Museum, and a PhD Candidate in Education at Lakehead University. She grew up in Moosonee, Ontario and currently resides in the Greater Toronto Area.

Dr. Cynthia Wesley-Esquimaux served as Vice Provost for Aboriginal Initiatives at Lakehead University for three years and is an adjunct assistant professor for the Faculty of Anthropology and maintains a status-only appointment at the University of Toronto's Faculty of Social Work. He has served as publisher of the Winnipeg Free Press, Director of Communications for the Assembly of First Nations and Union of Ontario Indians, and an adjunct professor of Indigenous Studies on the Laurentian University campus. Maurice lives in North Bay, where he operates Nimkii Communications, a public education practice with a focus on the treaty relationship that made possible the peaceful settlement of Canada. He is the author of "We are all Treaty People," "Nation to Nation: A resource on treaties in Ontario", and "Grandpa, what is a treaty, anyway?"

ROBERT GREENE

Robert Charles Greene is an Anishinaabe of the Ojibway Nation, born and raised on the reserve of Iskatewizaagegan No. 39 Independent First Nation. At the age of 11, he was sent away to attend the Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School, and later graduated with honours from Beaver Brae Secondary School in Kenora, Ontario.
