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

In a HWDSB board meeting in December, student trustees Deema Abdel Hafeez and Aisha Mahmoud called for their fellow trustees to reconsider their decision to elect trustee Becky Buck to the position of vice chair, citing that she had been named in the board's racism probe in 2021.

'The board's decision last Monday [to elect Buck] acts as a hindrance toward the HWDSB's ability to serve the student body. The harm that has been done has not gone away in our student community and the work that needs to be done is ongoing," said Mahmoud in her address to the trustees in the board meeting on December 6.

Buck was one of four HWDSB trustees named in a racism probe conducted at the board as a result of allegations raised by a former student trustee. In its findings, Buck was deemed to have made a racist comment during a board meeting in which trustees discussed the cancellation of the police liaison program. The report concluded that Buck had labelled activists and concerned meeting attendees, 'Twitter trolls,' and that she was racist in her

opposition to the creation of an in the running for the position, saying, Indigenous student trustee position.

A vocal opponent to the election of Buck as vice chair came from the coalition, Hamilton Students for Justice, an advocacy group which student trustees met with before discussing concerns with the board. These calls have been echoed by the Equity Network of Dundas and the board's own human rights and equity community advisory committee.

Members of the committee have protested her opportunity to even run for the position, citing the same racism probe which prompted them to request for Buck's resignation back in the spring. Members of the committee have expressed their doubts that Buck will continue with the "amazing work" being done by the board in the areas of human rights policies and anti-Black racism efforts.

The committee has put through four recommendations to the board, presented at the board meeting on January 17. Apart from requesting Buck to step down from the position of vice-chair, the committee has requested a more transparent voting process to be adopted in future chair and vice chair elections, asking for the banning of secret ballot votes. Gachi Issa, a member of the committee, questioned the credibility of Buck's victory over Paul Tut, the other trustee

"Who voted for her?"

In an interview with The Bay Observer, Buck acknowledged her hesitation to offer herself for the position of vice chair immediately, knowing there would be some opposed to the idea because of the report. Before the nomination, Buck met with all of her fellow trustees and afterwards, said how fortunate she was to live in a time when women can achieve everything they wish to accomplish. However, Buck also testified to there being a climate of fear among trustees at the board, all scared of saying the wrong thing.

"It's scary that in this social media era everything you say is analysed and pulled apart. That if you have a position others disagree with—you are (considered) a hate-filled person. But it's part of being in public

As one of the most crucial changes in modern Canadian society, Indigenous recognition is a significant issue moving into 2022. From the Wet'suwet'en pipeline protests that spanned the country to the discoveries of the unmarked graves containing Indigenous children at many former residential schools, the new decade has been a trying one for Canada's Indigenous population. Recognition of their past and present struggles and reconciliation is a constitutional goal for many organizations, including the HWDSB.

Here at Ancaster High, year-over-year efforts to introduce the culture and heritage of Canada's Indigenous population have affected curriculums and school spirit days alike. Many students have been exposed to Indigenous novels and books written by First Nations authors in their English classes, for example. There have also been daily land acknowledgements before the national anthem as a new standard practice. Speaking to the Assistant Head of Humanities, Mr. Powles, through email correspondence, the change in the procedure for the morning land acknowledgement was touched upon with him saying, "We tend to agree that 'OF COURSE we will start the school day with O Canada'...I'd like for that 'of course-ness' to include the Land Acknowledgement as well," hence the change from intermittent readings to a daily occurrence.

In the Ancaster community, an ongoing struggle over heritage and history has been followed by the local news for months, initially catching headlines with the destruction of the

Marr house on the corner of Wilson and Academy St. In an article titled: We are all treaty people, published 8 October, 2020, the Pastor of the Ancaster Village Church, Aaron Gerrard, applauded the efforts and citizens calling for the protection of Ancaster's history. He connected these efforts in Ancaster and the advocacy for this issue to "those similarly raised by our Indigenous neighbours."

It is important to remain vigilant to the fact that Ancaster's settler history is not the first history of this land, which falls under the Between the Lakes Treaty, also known as Treaty 3. As the history of Ancaster began, with each road laid and each tree felled, the generations of Indigenous people on these lands have watched their history be erased bit by bit. For some in Ancaster, a similar fate faces them as the buildings that make up their story and history are destroyed, and their land redeveloped.

"When history is erased, whether haphazardly or in the name of progress, we hurt. It does not matter if you are a settler or Indigenous," wrote

However, therein lies a difficult question, one about the struggle each group faces. No justifiable statement can ever be used to equate the struggle of the Indigenous people to the struggles faced by the 'settler' community in Ancaster. Is it permissible to transcend the time between the eras and infer how one group might feel about such a significant issue? Doing so might be an unknowing use of transcendentalism; the philosophy that states that by using your five senses to take in the immediate situation, you can learn a grander truth about the world on a

Brandon house and currently with the larger scale. One of the fundamentals of this movement is the disadherence to institution; it says that you do not need to be an expert to understand Immediate, indirect experience is enough. Can that be true in this situation? Can a 'settler' empathize with the struggles of the Indigenous peoples of Canada to an extent where the hurt resulting from the loss of historical Ancaster landmarks can equate with that from the development of ancestral land of the various nations around Ontario?

> Regardless, it is difficult to assign an equal hurt to the issues of today in Ancaster to the plight of centuries past. In the final remarks of Gerrards article, however, he writes that, "As we work to remember and safeguard the history of Ancaster, let us not forget that we should owe the same commitment to our Indigenous hosts." As settlers, it is our responsibility to recognize the unique circumstances faced by the Indigenous populations. Never should their hardships be undermined or downplayed, and as a school and a community, there is always room for change. In my conversation with Mr. Powles, one of his aims for the school's efforts is that "...whatever we DO do is not performative and not just opportunities for virtue-signalling. I would like for the celebration part to be more front-and-centre more so than it is

> "I'd love to hear students talking in my class about the show Reservation Dogs, or listening to the Halluci Nation, or talking about attending a Pow Wow or eating indian tacos," says Powles. This is a noble goal for the future, and one that the students of Ancaster High can aim for in the new year.

Violent Kazakhstani anti-government protests and riots have clashed with law enforcement, leading to dozens of reported deaths, hundreds of hospitalizations, and thousands of arrests. The nation-wide demonstrations have evolved into an international incident, with the deployment of thousands Russian-led CSTO troops into the country. While the protests have since calmed down, they will show key answers, such as Russia's role in the geopolitical theatre and the fate of CSTO, often called Russia's NATO.

Kazakhstan was formerly part of the Soviet Union before declaring independence in 1991. The young country is one of the world's most prominent energy producers and the largest in Central Asia, producing 40% of the world's uranium and 1.6 million barrels of oil a day. However, Kazakhstan remains staunchly totalitarian, ranking 155th out of 180 countries on Reporters Without Borders's press freedom index and requiring government permits for protests and strikes.

The protests started with the removal of the price cap on liquefied petroleum gas, also known as LPG, claiming supply issues due to low prices. As LPG is cheaper than other fuel alternatives, Kazakhstanis have come to depend on LPG for their cars and the trucking industry. After the ban, LPG spiked over 50% overnight and later doubled in price. The rising fuel costs led to protests in the province of Zhanaozen, a desert province which imports most of their commodities and whom high LPG prices would affect the most.

Both peaceful and violent demonstrations have since spread across the country, with reports of widespread damage and looting, along with government buildings being broken into and burned. Almaty, Kazakhstan's largest city and former capital, saw the brunt of the destruction, with the declaration of a state of emergency and the temporary closure of Almaty International Airport after demonstrators seized the building.

To quell the protests, the government reintroduced the LPG price cap. However, the protests had since morphed into a wider anti-government stance, with demands for change ranging from the country's rampant corruption to the lack of civil liberties.

Kazakhstan's head of state, President Tokayev, has responded to the protests with rapid and forceful law enforcement, calling the unrest an attempted coup d'etat and a colour revolution, a pejorative term claiming that protest leaders were Western-trained agents directed to topple Kazakhstan's government.

Tokayev has also ordered law enforcement and intelligence agencies to "fire without warning", "shoot to kill", and "liquidate" protesters, which has only fueled more dissent. The Kazakh defence minister has also since been fired over "leadership qualities".

Tokayev has also chosen to fire heavily-disliked former President Nursultan Nazarbayev from head of the NSC, Kazakhstan's domestic intelligence agency, along with the two deputy heads, Marat Osipov and Daulet Ergozhin. The former head of the NSC was also arrested under treason allegations and "actions aimed at forcibly seizing power."

However, even with his forceful response, Tokayev struggled to contain the crisis. As a result, on January 5, Tokayev requested the deployment of soldiers form the Collective Security Treaty Organization's (CSTO's) peacekeeping forces against the "foreign-trained terrorists." The request was accepted with the deployment of 2500 mainly Russian troops into Kazakhstan, along with tanks and military aircraft.

The CSTO was meant to be a mutual defence treaty between the former Soviet states of Russia, Armenia, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Belarus, and Kazakhstan, and has been referred to as a replacement to the Warsaw Pact.

In reality, the treaty has seen little use, with the organisation abstaining from both the 2010 Kyrgyzstan ethnic conflicts and the Armenia-Azerbaijan armed clashes in 2021. Kazakhstan's activation was likely to instil relevance and good press back into the organisation. While the CSTO is only to be used against foreign attacks, Kazakhstan likely found a loophole by claiming the unrest as a colour revolution and therefore a

foreign threat.

Russia's involvement has not gone unnoticed by the wider political circles. The US's Secretary of State, Antony Blinken, has decried Russia's involvoment into Kazakhstan, stating "once Russians are in your house, it's sometimes very difficult to get them to leave". The Moscow foreign ministry fired back, framing Blinken as a hypocrite by pointing to the US's past military interventions. Further responses against Blinken have increased with the CSTO's successful withdrawal.

Overall, Kazakhstan and CTSO security forces have succeeded in quelling the protests, and the CSTO forces have since completely left the country. However, the events in Kazakhstan will have heavy implications on what the CSTO does and when it can be deployed, potentially setting a precedent for more authoritarian leaders to use the organisation to counter internal discontent.

The organisation may also begin to intervene more, diplomatically and militarily, in international affairs. There remain many such circumstances within Eurasia such as the Kyrgyzstan-Tajikistan-Uzbekistan border disputes or Central Asia's rising water scarcity that could justify CSTO involvement and advance Russia's control over the region.

The deployment could also cement Russia's control over Kazakhstan and to counter Chinese, Western, and Islamist influences. Nevertheless, the Kazakhstan protests and the subsequent deployment will have rippling effects on the balance of power in Central Asia and the CSTO's and Russia's international importance.

The I-95, also known as Interstate 95, the largest North-South highway in the US, was also the site of one of the longest traffic jams in American history. Winter Storm Frida combined with several accidents worked to create a traffic jam spanning 80 kilometers long. This left drivers waiting for hours in subzero temperatures, with some waiting as much as a full day before traffic began moving again. How such a massive crisis could have occurred has been a focus of controversy, frustration, investigation.

On January 3, a major winter storm fell with full force on Virginia, dropping between 17 to 27 centimeters of snow at a record rate of two centimeters an hour, leaving hundreds of thousands without power and causing five deaths. The storm also resulted in almost five centimeters of rain per hour over the area before the snowfall, preventing the use of salt or chemicals to avoid ice accumulation on roads.

The snowy and icy conditions eventually led to the infamous pileup and subsequent traffic jam on the I-95, with accidents involving upwards of six tractor-trailers. Unable to move, those stuck in the gridlock had no choice but to wait in the freezing temperatures. The weather conditions also forced an Amtrak passenger train to wait on the tracks for upwards of 30 hours, with reports of low food and overflowed toilets.

Relief struggled to reach the area as the storm had knocked out traffic cameras and continued to dump snow across the state. Road crews worked overnight to clear the roads but

heavy snowfall, fallen trees and powerlines, and other factors made opening the roads a long and arduous process. By January 4, progress was finally being made and by the evening, most of the traffic was cleared out.

The motorists in the logjam were left with limited amounts of food, water, and gas, which led to some turning off their engines to ration fuel and heat. The congestion also significantly slowed emergency vehicles from reaching necessary locations, with reports of potential hypothermia cases and needed relief for worried diabetics. While four patients were transported out of the scene, fortunately, no injuries or deaths were reported in the traffic jam.

In the midst of the crisis was US Senator Tim Kaine, who was trapped on his drive to the Capitol. Under regular conditions, the drive would only take about two hours, but instead took Kaine a total of 27 hours to reach his destination. Similar stories came from NBC correspondent Josh Lederman, who spoke on NBC's Today show while trapped on I-95, claiming he had been stuck for 10 hours yet remained 50 kilometers from Washington.

Lederman's response was not alone, with criticism from citizens and lawmakers alike. Virginia Governor Ralph Northam came under major fire for his actions against the crisis. Many also criticised how the "world's richest country" couldn't solve the traffic jam. Demands for the deployment of the National Guard were denied, with Northam justifying the decision by stating that getting crews to the necessary locations was the limiting factor, not manpower.

Slow response times and the seeming lack of action by the government was also a source of disapproval, with examples including not efficiently closing down the highway to prevent further traffic. US Representative Abigail Spanberger called the gridlock a "catastrophe" and demanded for Virginia governors Northam and Youngkin to conduct a closely-examined, cross-agency report on the matter. The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has stated that they will take an "exhaustive look" at the event and the circumstances surrounding it.

Humorously, Gleen Youngkin, the winner of the Virginia election scheduled to be sworn in on January 15 also came under fire, despite not being in office yet.

Many questions remain on how the traffic jam got so severe, as it shut down the largest transit artery on the US's East Coast for hours. The VDOT's report will answer certain questions, but will likely raise more questions on how to prevent another disaster and who's to blame for the I-95 traffic jam. Such a report could affect the political structures on the state and possibly at the federal level, tackling key questions such as infrastructure. Only time will tell how the US will react to the I-95 traffic jam and how it came to be.

On February 1st, the Lunar New Year arrived and marked the beginning of the lunar calendar. The previous lunar year has been running since February 12, 2021, and drew to a close on January 31, 2022.

You may be wondering why the Lunar New Year day isn't on January 1st. This is because Lunar New Year is based on the lunar calendar, whereas January 1st is the New Year based on the Gregorian calendar. The lunar calendar is based on the monthly cycles of the Moon's phases, while the Gregorian calendar is a solar calendar based on the Earth's passage around the Sun.

Each year in the lunar calendar is represented by an animal from the Chinese zodiac system of 12 animals. This cycle of animal zodiac signs is repeated every 12 years and over the course of 60 years, each passes through the five elements: metal, water, wood, fire and earth. The 12 animals in order are: Rat, Ox/Cow, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Goat, Monkey, Rooster/Chicken, Dog, and Pig. It is believed that each zodiac animal has its own characteristics and that people born in the same year have similar personalities, similar to the Western astrological signs.

2022 is the year of the Tiger. Some of the other years of the Tiger include 2010, 1998, 1986, 1974, 1962, 1950, 1938, and 1926. This means people born in these years will share the Tiger's characteristics. This includes:

- Vigour and ambition
- Daring and courage
- Enthusiasm and generosity
- Self-confidence
- A sense of justice and a commitment to help others for the greater good

Lunar New Year is widely celebrated in many different countries across the world, including China (Spring Festival), Vietnam (Tét nguyên Đán), and Korea (Seollal). Despite the fact that these celebrations are all based on China's traditional lunar calendar, the celebrations are completely unique in their own cultures.

WHY ALL RED?

Red has been the most symbolic color in China since ancient times, representing passion happiness, and hope. In Lunar New Year, it's a belief that red will bring good fortune and scare away evil spirits, which is why we decorate with red lanterns, couplets, paper cuttings, and give red envelopes!

The Spring Festival is one of the most important holidays in China, influencing many other Lunar New Year celebrations. China's Spring Festival traditions include putting up decorations, offering sacrifices to ancestors, eating reunion dinner with family on New Year's Eve, giving red envelopes and other gifts, firecrackers and fireworks, and watching lion and dragon dances. The Spring Festival normally lasts 16 days, from New Year's Eve to the 15th day of the New Year.

Tết nguyên Đán is one of the celebrated and important holidays in Vietnamese culture. It is

There are many superstitions on Lunar New Year's Day you should avoid, a few examples are: Washing your hair or clothes washes away luck, cleaning your house sweeps away wealth, eating porridge is said to bring poverty, and mentioning unlucky words brings it (Ex. Death).

celebrated for at least three days and many Vietnamese and Hoa people prepare for Tét by making special holiday foods and cleaning their homes. Tết nguyên Đán customs and traditions include visiting a person's house on the first day of the new year, worshiping ancestors, exchanging New Year's greetings, giving lucky money to children and the elderly, opening a shop, and visiting relatives, friends and neighbours.

Meanwhile, Seollal considered to be a holiday reserved for families in Korean culture. During the three-day holiday, Koreans visit their hometown and gather with their family and relatives to perform an ancestral ritual called charye. As well, they practice other traditions and customs, such as wearing hanbok, eating traditional food, and playing folk games. Children also perform formal bows to their elders and receive money

However, due to the worldwide surge in COVID-19 and now its Omicron variant, most people all around the world were unable to practice these traditions. To go through this difficult time of sickness and sporadic lockdowns, perhaps we should try to be more like the Tiger this year; vigorous with a commitment to help others for the greater good.

Valentine's Day well-known holiday that occurs every year on February 14th. Although it is known as a day to celebrate love and affection, its history and origins are very different from what we know the event to be now.

The whole holiday is somewhat of a mystery, but it is suggested that it has Christian and Roman origins. There are a couple of different stories about how the holiday was created, such as the Roman festival of Lupercalia, which is celebrated in the middle of February. This festival celebrated the coming of spring and fertility, dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture, as well as to the Roman founders Romulus and Remus.

Others claim that Valentine's Day is celebrated in the middle of February to commemorate the anniversary of Valentine's death and burial. However, there were several Christian martyrs named Valentine, leading to multiple stories within this claim. The first is that Valentine's Day may have taken its name from a priest who was martyred about 270 CE by Emperor Claudius II Gothicus. Legend says that the priest who was then imprisoned signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailor's daughter, whom he had befriended.

Another story was that the holiday was named after St. Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who was also beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome. It could even be possible that both of the two saints were the same person.

Another common legend is that St. Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Claudius II stated that single men were better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for those men. Valentine realized the injustice of the decree and defied Claudius II. He did this by secretly marrying couples, and once those actions were discovered, Claudius II ordered that Valentine be put to death.

All these legends lead to the fact that this day is associated with love. Although the holiday's true history is quite unclear, every story emphasizes that Valentine was a sympathetic, heroic, and romantic figure. However, Valentine's Day was not celebrated as a day of romance until around the 14th century.

DID YOU KNOW?

The first known official celebration of Valentine's Day took place in Paris on February 14, 1400, which is when King Charles VI of France established La cour amoureuse, or the High Court of Love.

The oldest known written valentine that still exists today was a poem written in 1415. This was by Charles, Duke of Orleans, and was written for his wife while he was imprisoned in the Tower of London after his capture at the Battle of Agincourt. However, more formal valentine's messages started appearing in the 1500s. By the late 1700s, commercially printed cards began being produced.

Though Valentine's Day is most popular in the United States, Britain, Canada, and Australia, it is also celebrated in other countries such as Argentina, France, Mexico, and South Korea. In the Philippines, it is the most common wedding date.



Two-week Lockdown:

Although once hopeful that the pandemic would subside soon, the latest Omicron variant has emerged and caused hundreds of thousands of new cases in Ontario, catapulting us back to lockdowns and stricter protocols. Officials were left at a difficult position in deciding how the province should act in regards to events such as school operations amongst the current situation. Thus, their announcement was delayed twice, first to Thursday, December 30th, and then to Monday, January 3rd.

During the December 30th announcement, Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Kieran Moore, stated that the return to school would still remain in-person, but it would be pushed back by two days to January 3rd instead.

On January 3rd, at a news conference, Premier Doug Ford announced the new changes that would be implemented to take action against the pandemic and resist the new variant. Schools were delayed from January 5th to the 7th, and schools were moved from in-person learning to remote learning until at least January 17th. He cited that the province could not guarantee that schools would be fully staffed, since many teachers were expected to be off sick. Some other restrictions included temporarily closing indoor dining and gyms. Also, non-urgent medical procedures were paused because it would overwhelm the health-care province's according to public health officials. "Our public health experts tell us we could see hundreds of thousands of cases every day," Ford stated. This meant that hospitals could end up thousands of beds short.

Reopening Schools:

On January 10th, Ontario schools were confirmed to reopen on Monday, the 17th. Although COVID-19 cases are continuing to rise with no sign of slowing down, it was still planned for schools to reopen on the 17th, which it did. Additionally, the leaders of two of Ontario's largest teachers unions said that they were not consulted at all about the decision, and questioned how schools were any safer than the previous week.

Karen Brown, president of the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario, talked about how education workers should have been told ahead of time. "We had to find out via social media," Brown discussed. "The courtesy wasn't extended to us. It really sent the message to education workers that decision like this should have been communicated to us."

Furthermore, complaints came from parents after hearing that schools are no longer notifying them of all school outbreaks. On January 12th, the government announced that parents would only be notified of a potential COVID-19 outbreak when around 30% of staff and students in the school were absent, but that data would be available before the threshold was met. To continue, parents would not be notified of each COVID-19 case or exposure within their child's school. This was not the news parents wanted to hear,

considering their concerns about the potential spread of the virus.

As stated on the HWDSB "Due to widespread transmission of the Omicron variant and changes to the provincial testing approach, the Ministry of Education announced that it would be suspending reporting of COVID-19 cases in schools.

As of January 24th, data would become available on the province's website on a regular basis.

Ever since the coronavirus emerged in late 2019, like all viruses do, it began to mutate. Every time a virus replicates, its genetic code can undergo random minor errors, as the duplications are not always exact. Over time, these small changes lead to alterations in the virus' surface proteins or antigens, creating a mutated virus, which is known as a variant of the original virus.

To provide some background information, the Omicron variant was first reported by scientists in South Africa on November 24th, 2021. They discovered that this variant had an alarming amount of high mutations and distinct alteration, leading the World Health Organization (WHO) to officially name this variant as Omicron. This

follows the Greek alphabet, as always, but skipping Nu in regards to similarities to New, and Xi in regards to the common surname. WHO has three distinct categories it can place a variant in: a variant of interest, a variant of concern, and a variant of high consequence. Luckily, Omicron nor any other previous variants as of now has been classified as a variant of high consequence.

The WHO claimed that Omicron was said to be a variant of concern immediately two days after its discovery. A variant of concern simply means a variant that has been observed to be more infectious, thus being more likely to cause breakthroughs or re-infections in those who are vaccinated or previously infected. Experts believe that the Omicron variant has over 30 mutations, where many of these mutations are on the spike protein, the part of the virus that enters human cells. These mutations are the cause of the higher transmission rates, as well as the higher chance of escaping the body's vaccinated immune defences, compared to the original strain of the virus. Along with Omicron, the Alpha, Beta, Gamma, and Delta variants are also all classified as variants of concern.

In terms of the symptoms caused by the Omicron variant, so far, the symptoms are reported to be relatively mild, particularly for those who are vaccinated. One key difference observed as of now is that those who have been diagnosed with Omicron have no reports of a significant loss of taste and smell. As Omicron is still considered fairly new, the minimal data can only somewhat confirm the main symptoms of the variant, which are not too different from the commonly known symptoms already:

- Cough
- Fatigue or tiredness
- Congestion and runny nose
- Sore throat
- Headache or fever
- Muscle aches

Health pathologist Shangxin Yang from the University of California shares insight on why the variant is seen as much more dangerous than the original strain, as he suggests that the reasoning for these current breakthroughs of the vaccine is how we are having "a vaccine that was created almost two years ago for a virus that appeared two years ago." This puts the variants on a higher level than us: we would need to evolve and alter our vaccines to match the variant's changes. "Once we have a vaccine that is based on the current variant, we can catch up with the virus," Yang continues.

Though many are tired of hearing more news of another COVID-19 strand discovery, there is no other way to prevent this; as long as the coronavirus continues to spread throughout the global population, mutations will inevitably arise. All we can do is remain safe by following COVID-19 protocols and, as usual, wait for future vaccines to help protect us.

After nearly 20 years without an installment, the Matrix saga released its newest edition on December 22, 2021 with The Matrix: Resurrections. The movie saw the return of an aged (Keanu Reeves), Trinity (Carrie-Anne Moss) and Niobe (Jada Pinkett Smith), along with other loved characters with new actors, such as Morpheus (Yahya Abdul-Mateen II) and Agent Smith (Jonathan Groff). The movie even saw the return of Lana Wachowski as director.


This article will contain minor spoilers for The Matrix: Resurrections, with large portions of the beginning exposed, and will also require some forms of knowledge about the previous The Matrix movies. Skip the following paragraphs if you want to discover the movie without spoilers.

The movie begins with Bugs, a Matrix escapee, and her operator, Sequoia, visiting a piece of looping old code. After finding it was a trap, Bugs runs and hides before confronting Morpheus, a program who has also escaped from the Matrix. They then exit the Matrix, destined to find who coded the loop to prevent them from potentially deleting Morpheus.

We are then introduced to Neo, a flourishing video game designer who came to fame with his hit video game series The Matrix, unconsciously based on his memories in the previous trilogy. He meets Trinity, now named Tiffany, as a married mother of three, however, neither recognize each other. Morpheus pinpoints the looping code

to a file on Neo's computer, and Matrix, while accidentally setting Agent Smith, who had survived by "bonding" to Neo, free. However, Trinity remains wired in.

As Neo and Trinity together are necessary to maintain a power supply, the Matrix's Analyst demands that Neo voluntarily enter his pod, threatening to kill Trinity. A dangerous game of bluffs and wagers ensues; as Neo attempts to convince Trinity to escape, The Analyst tries to stop him with all his might, and a wild Agent Smith remains on the loose.




Ratings for Resurrections have been mixed, with a 64% critic rating on Rotten Tomatoes and a 63% rating from audiences. The movie was a box office bomb, making \$12 million in the opening weekend against the predicted \$40 million. Costing \$190 million, The Matrix: Resurrections grossed only \$136 million, meaning the film has yet to turn a profit.

The Matrix: Resurrections successfully rescues Neo from the certainly maneuvers away from The Matrix's tradition of exploring key philosophical questions such as free will and what defines reality. Instead, it seems to focus on the complex, orchestrated action sequences also synonymous with the series, which it does with varying degrees of success. Overall, while the sequences are one-of-a-kind, they lack narrative purpose and ultimately distract and delay from the rest of the movie.

> In addition, the movie also chose to lower the stakes on just saving Trinity, a major drop from ensuring the safety of Zion or securing peace between humanity and the machines. Low stakes led to a less theatrically powerful climax, as the outcomes for failure were extremely lowered.

Momentum with the movie's narrative was also unnecessarily broken several times. A well-made movie will make the audience want to see the next scene, but Resurrections struggled to continue this throughout the movie, choosing to pause for exposition and action sequences, ultimately breaking up the flow of the narrative and decreasing the meaning of the given information.

However. Resurrections manages to still be watchable, with powerful and interesting action scenes, a partially-intriguing plot, and new takes on key elements such as the Matrix's Agents. I would rate the film a 5.5/10: enough to suffice at entertaining you, but not enough to be a first pick. Watch if you would like, but acknowledge that there would likely be a better use of your time.





But really, why should you watch this show? This show has POC representation, actual teenagers



Contrary to popular belief, Valentine's Day is not just about lovers, but it is for friends and family as well. Of course, Valentine's Day is not the only day to share our love with those around us, but it is another opportunity to let our friends and family know that we love and appreciate them.

Now, let's take this chance to express our love and appreciation to our friends and family by making them a little treat:

Recipe 1: Sugar Cookies

These classic sugar cookies make wonderful Valentine's Day gifts. You can decorate them in whatever Valentine's Day designs you want. You can even put cute messages on them! Bonus points if you cut them out in heart shapes.

Ingredients:

- 3 cups white flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder desi
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 cup soft butter
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Instructions:

- 1. Take the following dry ingredients: flour, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon and mix them in one bowl
- 2. In another bowl, take the following ingredients: butter, sugar, egg, vanilla, and almond extract and mix until it is fluffy
- **3.** Add the dry mixture to the wet mixture little by little
- 4. The dough should be firm, easily peeled away from the bowl, and no longer sticky. If the dough turns out too wet, add more flour
- **5.** On a lightly floured surface, knead it until it is malleable
- **6.** Roll the dough out with a rolling pin, 2cm to 3cm thick
- 7. Cut out into desired shapes
- 8. Put the cookies on wax paper and bake them in the oven at 375 F for 15 minutes

Royal Icing

Ingredients:

- 3 cups powdered sugar
- 1 tablespoon melted butter
- 1/8 teaspoon almond extract6-8 tablespoons warm water
- Food colouring

Instructions:

- In a large bowl, whip all the ingredients together until desired consistency
- 2. Divide the icing into the number of colours wanted
- 3. Add food colouring to the icing batches
- 4. MAKE SURE THE COOKIE IS COMPLETELY COOL. Decorate cookies with icing.

Recipe 2: Chocolate Truffles

If you're not a baker or if you don't have access to an oven, don't worry, I got you. Although these chocolate truffles are easy and simple to make, they are full of sincerity and make for a perfect Valentine's Day gift. It's soft, sweet, and very delicious.

Ingredients:

- 200g dark chocolate
- 100g heavy cream
- Topping of choice (cocoa powder, sprinkles, etc)

Instructions:

- 1. Chop the chocolate into small pieces and put it into a bowl
- 2. Heat up the heavy cream and pour it over the chopped chocolate
- **3.** Let the chocolate and the cream sit in the bowl for a few minutes
- **4.** After a few minutes, stir until the chocolate is melted
- 5. Put the mixture in the refrigerator until set, usually about 1-2 hours
- 6. Roll it into balls and coat in toppings. An easy way to do this is by putting your toppings and your chocolate balls in a plastic bag and shaking it. This will allow your truffles to be coated with toppings evenly




