As 2021 comes to a close, many of us have accepted that the change of a new year can't prevent the negative impacts of inflation that are to come, and sadly, food prices are no exception to this upcoming change. Canada's Food Price Report has recently published their annual report, researched by Dalhousie University and the University of Guelph. This report displays all of the analytical statistics they have calculated on this predicted inflation.

To summarize, throughout 2021, food prices have been rising as a result of the pandemic-plagued year, concluding in a 3-5% rise. As 2022 is approaching, the effects of the pandemic are generally predicted to lessen due to the world slowly opening back up again, hinting that food prices won't be as severely raised as before. Despite this statement, the annual report claims that food prices are predicted to somewhat disconnect from this trend, and instead, food-related inflation will likely increase alarmingly even more, expecting a 5-7% rise, or to put in perspective, an extra \$966.00 per year for a typical four-member family.

We may wonder, what exactly causes the inflation of food prices when there's not as strong of a correlation with the pandemic? With the help of Sylvain Charlebois, the chief researcher on the report, the annual report can successfully identify and explain the various reasons why these food prices are rising. To put simply, even though climate change and its dangerously rising temperatures is the prominent reason, it mainly narrows down to the specific food group and subcategorized industries that produce these goods:

Fruits, Vegetables, & Bakery:

The effects of climate change have negatively affected the farming industry, specifically vital grounds, such as the prairies, where wheat and other crops are grown. These crucial lands

suffered from hot dry summers this inflation outside of just food prices past year and are predicted to also be present in 2022, which greatly hinders the mass harvest of these crops. As a result, this reduces the supply of these goods and increases the price.

Also ironically known as, "meatflation," the environment of livestock has been suffering from the effects of climate change as well, but there are also other external reasons that add up to this rise in price. To explain, water scarcity and heat have forced farmers to reduce herd sizes, thus, reducing the overall supply of these meats and increasing the price. Not only are prices increasing, but these animals are unable live in well-suited environment-not affected by climate change-where they can be raised in a healthy manner. On a more positive note, almost half of surveyed Canadians in the report have changed their meat purchasing habits when they see the prices rise. This implies the adaptation of less purchases based on price and/or smaller quantities of meat being purchased.

Dairy is seen to have one of the largest rises in price, and this all roots back to having extremely higher input costs. This includes the feed, energy, fertilizer, labour, and transportation costs. The Canadian Dairy Commission had warned about this already during the past year, stating that retail milk prices are to rise by 8.4% due to the added costs throughout the entire production process.

Restaurants:

Menu prices are also expected to rise. It can generally be correlated to the overall purchased price of the food supply restaurants use to cook and serve with, where they are expected to sell their dishes at an equilibrium price in order to compensate with how much hey are spending. Furthermore, the report also states that the "widespread labour market challenges the rising commercial rents," implying that the


requires them to earn more money in order to continue their business and not be left in debt and/or be forced to close down.

"It's the highest increase that we're predicting in 12 years, both in terms of dollars and percentage."

Charlebois warned that this major change will heavily affect everyone's grocery bill, especially families that are already struggling to put food on the table. "The era of cheap food has ended...It's not going to be easy," Charlebois stated. These increases in food prices are ultimately going to lead to more families turning to and potentially relying on their local food banks, and then some may eventually not be able to meet the predicted higher demand. From this, we can understand the importance of communities collaboratively donating as many food supplies as they can for these struggling families. Unfortunately, communities that cannot provide enough supplies to meet these high demands can be detrimental for families in need.

As for what we can do in our communities, managing food price inflation can be a tough adjustment. It is highly suggested to encourage flexibility in buying habits. For example, trying to save up more than anticipated can help prepare families for the predicted effects of inflation and rising prices. Another example is to try and stick to foods that are in season, since they will generally be cheaper than the ones out of season due to their reduced supply. Adapting to these methods will ultimately help us prepare for what is yet to come in 2022. Though there are no current signs of the inflation reducing, we can only hope that inflation and prices of food will decrease and have less drastic changes sometime in the future.

Over the past few weeks, the violations of ceasefire and the large amalgamation of Russian troops at Ukraine and Russia's border has sparked concerns across the globe, with certain officials speculating about another potential invasion of Ukraine. With crisis in 2014, Russia continues to build a military presence on the Ukrainian border, while dismissing concerns as 'alarmist' and protesting the increasing forces of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), a military alliance between Canada, the United States, and the EU.

The relationship between Ukraine and Russia can be dated back to 1954, when Soviet Russia transferred the Crimean peninsula to Soviet Ukraine. The Soviet Union was a including Ukraine and Russia but collapsed in 1991, due to radical reforms made by its last leader, Mikhail Gorbachev.

After approximately 25 years of independence, in 2014, conflict erupted all across Ukraine when then-president Viktor Yanukovych rejected an agreement that would have made Ukraine closer to the EU, in favour of ties with Russia. This sparked protests across the country, with many becoming violent. In addition to corruption and vote-rigging accusations, he would eventually be ousted by parliament in 2014.

Following his removal, Russian troops, without insignia, entered the Crimean peninsula. Russia also backed Donbass region and took key cities, but strength to save Putin's dropping

was eventually pushed out by Ukrainian forces. Large amounts of both Russian and Ukrainian forces were collected in the Crimean peninsula, which to this day is still considered one of the most heavily armed places in the world. In a move that most Western countries have declared as illegal, Russia claims to have 'seized' and declared the Crimea peninsula as 'a part of modern Russia.'

Ukraine has acted as a political actions reminiscent of the Crimean stage for physical and diplomatic conflict between the EU and Russia. Geographically, Ukraine is wedged in between Western Europe and Russia, and its foreign policy has teetered between supporting EU and Russian policies over the years, with both sides eager to ally with the country. Russia has always viewed Ukraine as a country to which it is intrinsically linked, with Putin still referring to it as 'New Russia' and 'Little Russia,' names largely used during the Russian Empire.

Now, in 2021, seven years after republic made up of many countries the illegal annexation of Crimea, an increasing number of troops have been spotted near the Russia-Ukraine border. While what Russia plans to do is unknown, officials agree that this should be taken as a serious threat. Most experts agree that while full-out war is possible, it is also unlikely. This is due to how Russia appears to have made no effort to conceal its forces, and how an invasion would lead to a total breakdown in relations with the West and possibly the cancellation of Nord Stream 2, a major natural gas pipeline delivering Russian gas to the

What is more expected is that the increased military buildup is a signal from Russia that says they are serious about their relationship with Ukraine. This buildup could also be Ukrainian separatist groups in Ukraine's Russia attempting to flex their military

approval ratings, as Putin's ratings increased with the invasion and annexation of Crimea, and this may be a less politically harmful way of doing so.

Other reasons for this build-up include Russia trying to force concessions on the EU or testing how Biden's America will react, who so far has deployed two warships into the neighbouring Black Sea and said "all options" were on the table. Meanwhile, if Russia truly intends a full invasion, it would give Russia massive strategic and economic advantages, such as increased control over the Black Sea, Russia's only location for deep-sea ports, and the natural gas and steel capacity of Ukraine's Donbas regions.

While NATO has declared that tensions between Russia and Ukraine are likely to worsen, they have said that there is no obligation to defend Ukraine by sending military aid. However, NATO chief Stoltenberg has said that a Russian invasion would have "costs," most likely in the form of economic sanctions. NATO has made no clear interventions since the 9/11 attacks in 2001. Biden has stated that American troops would not defend Ukraine, but would defend Eastern European NATO allies in case of Ukrainian invasion. Biden completed a video call with Putin on December 8, but no breakthroughs were made.

Russia has stated that the deployment of NATO forces would cross a "red line" and trigger a response, even threatening to destroy GPS satellites, while fixtures necessary for a permanent stay, such as supply lines and medical tents, have been spotted in the build-up. For now, the world anxiously waits to see what the Russian government plans to do and whether the Ukrainian government will once again have to face invasion.

Belarusan President Alexander Lukashenko once again has been at the centre of a geopolitical conflict with the European Union. The EU is accusing Belarus of intentionally flooding neighbouring Poland, Latvia, and Lithuania with migrants in an attempt to coerce the EU into lifting sanctions, while Lukashenko claims that the EU has deprived the country of the money necessary to stop the migrants. Currently, it seems a resolution is far from now, while thousands of migrants remain trapped in political games.

Called the last dictator in Europe, Lukashenko, who is heavily connected with Russia, has led an authoritarian rule throughout his country, in spite of growing protests. In August 2020, Lukashenko supposedly won a sixth term with 80% of the vote, but the opposition party, along with the EU, UK, US, Canada, and Switzerland, called the election illegitimate and placed tough sanctions on Belarus.

Tensions between the countries further increased in May 2021, when Belarus scrambled a fighter jet to divert a Ryanair flight to Minsk, with reports of a bomb threat. However, Western powers claimed that the real purpose of the diversion was to arrest Roman Pratasevich, a dissident journalist, and his girlfriend. Calling the diversion a state-sponsored hijacking, they placed further sanctions on the country.

Many of the migrants have arrived from destabilized regions, such as the Middle East, such as Yemen, Iraq, and Afghanistan. Following relaxed visa rules, numerous migrants have received Belusan visas and flown to the country

Belarus's national airline, Belavia, is flying nearly twice as many flights a week from Istanbul, Dubai, and Damascus than the same time last year.

In addition to flying the migrants, Belarus has also been accused of actively helping the migrants cross the border, with reports of Belarus supplying the migrants with wire cutters, axes, and shovels, and Belarusan soldiers blinding Polish soldiers using lasers and attempting to destroy fencing.

This immigration crisis has continued for months, and has led to Lithuania, Latvia, and Poland declaring a state of emergency, and seeing the deployment of riot officers and other security forces to contain the situation. Poland has reported 17,000 legal migrant crossings in October, a massive spike from the 1,000 crossings in the first half of the year.

However, the main flashpoint of this crisis is at Poland's borders, where Polish officials have refused to allow migrants to enter, causing around 3,000 to 4,000 migrants to amass at the border and small groups attempting to slip past Polish security. 11 migrants have died at the time of writing.

Belarus is also accusing Poland of planning a military buildup, with 15,000 Polish troops, along with air defence systems and heavy vehicles spotted near the border. The Belarusan defence ministry referred to it as "a strike group of forces." The country has stated that it will respond to Poland's actions domestically and with its largest ally, Russia.

Belarus-Russia relations have been continually improving, especially after EU sanctions. Belarus is economically dependent on Russia, and is also Belarus's only diplomatic ally. Russia has predictively taken Belarus's side in the crisis. They held joint paratrooper drills and flew nuclear-capable bombers in a patrol over Belarus, all signs Belarus and Russia are working closer together. Lukashenko even offered the idea of hosting Russian nuclear weapons should Poland host them.

Poland has also declared a state of emergency along a three-kilometre stretch on the Belurasan border, and has deployed 12,000 soldiers and placed barbed wire fencing. In addition, Poland has also banned civilians, such as journalists, lawyers, and aid workers, from the declared state of emergency at the border, which has been met with condemnation by rights groups.

Belarus has since moved the migrants to a nearby logistics center after a skirmish broke out between migrants and Polish soldiers. Belarus also coordinated with Iraq for flights back home, an option hundreds of Iraqi migrants have taken. However, EU sanctions are still likely, given their support and solidarity of Poland, Latvia, and Lithuania, and Lukasheko's unwilling attitude could mean that this crisis could plausibly continue for months.

This crisis does show signs of thawing, like Belarus's move of migrants, the Iraqi flights, and communication between Lukashenko and German Chancellor Angela Merkel. However, a full de-escalation could take months, especially given how no side is in a position to concede. This crisis could also act as a catalyst for influential events and processes, such as Belarus further falling into the influence of Russia. This is a developing situation, so make sure to pay attention to this story.

For two weeks, representatives and heads of state from across the world met in Glasgow, UK, finally signing the Glasgow Climate Pact. Previously delayed a year by the COVID-19 pandemic, world leaders perform the complex would negotiations necessary for tackling the climate crisis. However, the event has faced criticism over the seeming indifference from rich nations to curb their emissions enough to avoid catastrophic climate outcomes.

In 1992, the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change obliged every country to protect the planet from dangerous amounts of climate change. The UN has hosted Conferences of the Parties (COPs), every year since 1995, and it has been where key climate change agreements have been signed, such as the 2015 Paris Agreement.

1.5°C over pre-industrial levels is often seen as the most amount of global warming allowed without catastrophic effects, such as severe sea level rise, crop failures, and large extinctions. To reach this benchmark, it's estimated that emissions need to halve by 2030 and reach net-zero by 2050. The 2021 IIRC report noted that a maximum of 1.5°C of warming was still possible, but required "unprecedented action" to be taken immediately.

In the pact, the countries made considerable improvements in the right direction. Over a hundred countries vowed to cut methane emissions by 30% by 2030, and also included a pledge to stop deforestation and land degradation by 2030, which was signed by countries holding over 85% of the forests on Earth.

these However, despite massive leaps, the pact also fails in certain areas. It doesn't lay out a timeline or plan on how to avoid violating the 1.5°C benchmark, or how the countries will be sharing the responsibility of cutting emissions, meaning that countries could be stuck in disagreements. In addition, the Nationally world's Determined Contributions (NDCs) for 2030 are still on track for a 2.4°C increase by 2100, and even if all NDCs were followed, it would still increase by 1.8°C. It's been advised for countries to "revisit and strengthen" their NDCs next year, which was otherwise scheduled to happen in 2025.

The summit also finished defining Article 6 from the Paris Agreement, which covered rules and regulations on carbon markets. Carbon markets are a form of making emitting carbon economically viable over time, such as the cap-and-trade system or having emission support projects and investments that can cancel emissions, such as tree planting.

This new Article 6 allows for

the creation and use of these systems to be used and removes possibilities of double-counting, also known as phantom credits. However, these systems are vulnerable to lobbying and stalling practices, as they are extremely difficult to establish.

COP26 also highlighted the different views and attitudes between poor and rich countries held when combating climate change. Climate change affects developing nations more, so many see achieving the 1.5°C to be the top priority, while developed nations are more interested in ensuring that their economies don't strain under too much pressure. Developing nations requested for the creation of a climate change reparations fund, stating that rich countries have directly harmed them with climate change. However, the fund was heavily opposed by the US and EU and was ultimately left out of the final draft.

This year stands for what many believe is the last chance to avoid the worst consequences for climate change, and another lost year could have disastrous results for years and even decades into the future. COP26 has taken large steps forward, but still lags behind and will require improvements in the next few years. This summit poses a powerful moment in the fight against climate change, and hopefully, enough action will be taken to protect those most vulnerable to the climate crisis.

Q: What made you want to teach math?

FIGHTING AGAINST THE FLOODS

It was only a mere two days after Remembrance Day when one of the most catastrophic natural disasters unfolded across British Columbia, breaking twenty records, making everyone wish that these records could never be touched again. In a matter of days to weeks, the severe flooding, also named as the November 2021 Pacific Northwest floods, has been destroying countless roads, vehicles, houses, and undeniably causing miserable injuries and deaths among civilians.

Backtracking to November 12th, before the floods occured, meteorologists had warned about an extreme rainstorm lasting for two days, which was caused by an atmospheric river that formed in the Pacific Ocean. The heavy rainfall was estimated to only create a small risk of local flooding, thus no official travel advisories or flood warnings were given out. Little did they know, the following morning's storm would end up furiously dumping nearly a month's worth of rain in just two days.

ATMOSPHERIC RIVER?

Atmospheric rivers are long and narrow regions in the atmosphere, as if they are actual rivers or pipes in the sky, that transport concentrated moisture or water vapour outside of the tropics. Once they make landfall, they release all the accumulated water vapour in precipitation.

Once the rainstorm ended, floods were forming in many towns and communities, but the bad news did not end there; soon, overwhelming amounts of reports of mudslides, destroyed roads, and vehicle collisions poured in at an alarming rate. Announcements about avoiding any unnecessary travels were made, but because of the inconvenient timing, many families were already traveling on the weekend. Some mudslides had large debris that crashed heavily onto highways along with the mud, not only blocking cars, but pushing some cars off the hills as well. This caused almost every major highway in southern British Columbia to close, forcing numerous travellers to abandon their vehicles on the road and to find shelter for the night.

As the days progressed, e communities reported floodwater breaching into their homes, making them go under a local state of emergency, requiring over 20,000 people to evacuate their homes, and causing a large number of shelves in supermarkets to empty out from panic buying. Almost everyone was impacted

negatively by the event, and according to BC Hydro, an electric utility, at least 60,000 homes were left without electricity across British Columbia. To worsen the news, more severe mudslides continue to pose a great danger to many. The Royal Canadian Air Force managed to rescue over 300 people by helicopter, but they have sadly found a woman's dead body under debris, making it the first recorded death of this disastrous event, while many more are still missing. Besides human lives, thousands of livestock and wild animals were also killed in the extreme weather. British Columbia declared a provincial state of emergency on November 17th.

On November 18th, 19th, and even earlier before, despite the mass destruction across the province, British Columbians are already determined to come together as a community to help as many people as they can who were dangerously affected by the storm. Thousands have volunteered to clean up, fill and deliver sandbags, and share supplies, all in favour to help those who suffered. Province officials have been slowly trying to recover from the scarring natural disaster as well, through rationing gasoline and ensuring that non-essential travel is banned on major re-opened roads. Repairing cities is estimated to take many months, and the estimated cost to rebuild some cities could be as much or more than \$1 billion.

The extensive flooding continues to be a major issue for November 20th and onwards, especially when atmospheric rivers continue to form and release absurd amounts of rain on these cities. Two particular communities, Abbotsford and Fraser Valley, both known for their agricultural production in the province, have experienced the worst of the floods.

Despite the hardship, progress is being made a month into the crisis, with certain highways opening to non-essential travel and the Trans Mountain pipeline being opened again, after three weeks of closure due to fears of leaks and damage. In addition, another evacuation order has been lifted, leaving only one in the area.

new federal committee to help with British Columbia's recovery, as well as helping those who are affected by any future extreme events. Trudeau also visited Abbotsford to view the flood damage in-person, and talked to local officials and first responders there, praising them for their community efforts and strength. Trudeau also stated that the extreme weather seen this year in British Columbia and other parts of Canada demonstrates the impacts of climate change. He also

alarmingly noted that these

consequences have arrived "sooner than

expected, and they are devastating."

HOW TO HELP

It is undoubtedly horrible to see British Columbia become a victim of the severe flooding and rainstorms that continued on for weeks, but we can still take action and send our support to the best of our abilities. The Canadian Red Cross is holding a nationwide fundraising campaign to help British Columbians overcome this tall hurdle. By going on their site (see below) right now, you can donate to help support those who have suffered from the catastrophic storm. Every \$1 donated will be tripled to \$3 by the Canadian Red Cross. To add on, many other fundraisers throughout Columbia were created to help relieve the disaster that British Columbians had to endure. To list a few examples, a GoFundMe was set up to directly help flooding victims, British Columbia's provincial government launched a disaster assistance program which also has a feature where it is possible to submit cash transfers, and many local organizations, such as ones in Abbotsford, have started their own disaster relief fund. By donating towards these fundraisers, it will immensely help these victims who have suffered from the extreme abnormal weather this past month.

Do you never read your emails and end up missing something important? Does your email account have 2000 unread emails? Well, in this article, I will try to show you how to manage your emails better so that does not happen.

The first thing you will want to do is put all of your emails in one place. You probably have at least two email accounts: your school/work account and your personal account. If you only have one account, skip this step. The best way to consolidate your emails is to use the Mail app already on your phone (if you have an iPhone) and on your school iPad for Ancaster High students. Go to Settings, then Mail > Accounts > Add Account. Then you will be able to choose what type of account to add. Add all of your accounts here, so that they all show up in the Mail app. If you are adding your school account, make sure to select Microsoft Exchange as the type of account, not Microsoft Outlook.

Next, you'll want to get rid of your spam mail. You probably have

many emails from companies or retailers you created accounts for, such as Quora. When you open these emails, you can usually find an unsubscribe button within the email itself. This is usually at the very top or the very bottom of the email, and in very small font. Clicking this should make the website stop sending you emails, clearing up your spam emails. Alternatively, you can have the emails appear in your spam folder, so you can separate your important emails from your spam emails while still having

Finally, you'll need to clear your email. If you've been accumulating spam emails for a while, your mail app could have over 1000 notifications! If you want to get rid of those notifications, first check all your emails from the past month to see if you missed anything important. Anything older than that is probably too old and irrelevant, but you can check it if you like. Then you'll need to mark all emails as read. To do that, click "Edit" at the top right corner of the mail app, then "Mark all" at the bottom left corner. This should make a menu with "Mark all as read" come up. Click on "Mark all as read". Now you should have zero current notifications for the app. This will let you easily

check if you have new important incoming emails.

In conclusion, to manage your emails better, put them all in one place, get rid of the spam, and clear your mailbox. I hope this article will help guide you to managing your emails a



Frankenstein, a name that most can instantly recollect, which begat numerous different parodies of media, discussions, and was summarily the kick-starter for the genre of science fiction, has once again proved itself apt for its recognition and praise for the past two hundred years.

I'd like to start with the fact that this book is definitely not for everyone, as the time period plays a chief factor and the language is broadly different to modern speak, and will be especially difficult if you aren't yet ensconced in reading older books (if you're looking to start I would begin with a book from fifty years ago, then seventy, a hundred, and so on to ease yourself into it instead of starting with 1818). The plot was interesting, extremely entertaining in the first hundred pages, and again in the last chapter, but the entire middle part was merely monotonous (as in I probably wouldn't have read the whole thing if I didn't have the obligation of this article). I even had to take a week longer to read it because I kept putting it off from boredom. The science-fiction-mad-scientist portion starts off strong in the beginning but is eventually muted toward the end. Nothing particularly arose in the book that I didn't like, but just

a lot of it wasn't particularly likeable either - just a whole lot of mediocre neutrality.

You might actually enjoy this story if you're a fan of geography, as it takes place all around the globe (yet somehow was vaguely xenophobic), and spares no word in giving a full description of the variety of settings.

The entire story is told in first person, and the majority is in passive style. The characters aren't that unique or interesting (except the monster, but even the main character's personality doesn't stand out). Despite this, it was certainly intriguing to read the realistic aspect of both sides being valid and not so black and white; there's no definitive good guy and bad guy. Toward the story's conclusion, you're not exactly sure who you should be rooting for. Out of a lot of classic books, Frankenstein is on the shorter side and includes an excellent plot, so if you can get through the writing, it could be a fulfilling and quick read. I was additionally surprised that the book didn't provide anything blatantly offensive and only really was contrived of ambiguous and short points if any at all. The story also contains a poetic flow with beauteous passages, and successfully achieved the nuance that the author was striving for. It's hilarious though that the entirety of the narrative is in a letter to someone (which you would definitely forget

halfway through) and also encompasses chapters. Not only that, but at one point in the story, it becomes a story being told in a story, that's also being told in a story, that's being told in a letter, or what I'd like to call, the 19th century rendition of *Inception*.

The initial lesson to be learned from Frankenstein isn't don't try to play god and bring inanimate objects to life, but one residual variable that seems to remain after every disaster is the drastic measures and effects of loneliness and isolation; loneliness overall is the primary recurring subject that seems to instigate the acts and thoughts of lunacy and rampage in the characters

While Frankenstein was often boring, if you're interested in the story and its philosophies I would recommend it - although it wasn't absolutely revolutionary, I undeniably didn't regret reading it and it surely will give you various rich topics to think about. Subsequently, if you enjoy the everybody dies trope, crying in the rain, morose and dramatic themes and acts, insanity masked as passion, the marring of characters in a pitiful manner, abrupt but refreshing poems in the middle of chapters, sad and solemn endings, and unreliable narrators, I'm sure Frankenstein would make an auspicious recommendation for you! Nielsen, the Ascendance Series is one of my favourites, largely from the original trilogy, which I have read multiple times. With the series concluded now, one question remains: is the series worth the read or should it remain on the shelf?


Ascendance The Series consists of five books: The False Prince, The Runaway King, The Shadow Throne, The Captive Kingdom, and The Shattered Castle. The books are told from the perspective of an orphan boy, Sage, who is a citizen in the kingdom of Carthya. The series follows his ascent to king, until he is forced to defend himself and his country from the threat of neighbouring nations. While that is a very basic summary, the series itself is full of intricate plots, trickery, deceit, and twists which may catch some off-guard.

Nielsen is able to weave together an intricate and intriguing plot which leaves you constantly wondering what will happen next. The characterization in the books are fantastic, enabling readers to both emphasize with the heroes and truly hate the villains, which is a testament to how well they are written. Overall, the series is a glowing recommendation from me, I'd give it overall an 8.5/10. However, in my opinion, the original trilogy (The False Prince, The Runaway King, and The Shadow Throne) are the best books of the series, and I'd give those a 10/10.

In order to write more specifically about the individual books, it's difficult to avoid some spoilers, so if you already plan on reading the series, or at least the first book, then I would suggest that you stop reading here.

SPOILER ALERT

The False Prince kicked off the series back in 2012, centered around an orphan boy named Sage. Early on in the story, he is bought by a nobleman named Conner, along with two other orphans, Tobias and Roden. About a quarter to halfway through the book, they are told that the three boys have been brought there to play the role of the dead prince of Carthya; Jaron. Conner reveals that the entire royal family has been killed, and one of the three boys will pretend to be the dead Prince Jaron, under the guise of being in hiding for the previous years. The rest of the book centres around the competition to be crowned the prince and the twists and turns necessary to

do so. However, the main twist of the book comes near the end, where it is revealed that Sage is actually Prince Jaron, who had survived his assassination attempt and had spent the time since, in hiding, pretending to be the orphan boy Sage. It's a great entry into the series, setting up the world and characters well, along with a very intriguing plot which pulls you in and makes it hard to put the book down.

The Runaway King picks up where The False Prince left off, with Jaron, king of Carthya, and the threat of war looming large. The story focuses on him preparing for war by attempting to get his former friend, Roden, back on his side. This time the story ventures away from Carthya, and into pirate territory, accompanied by the first book's trickery and humour. Much like the first, it is very well written, and continues its good characterization and intriguing plot. The Shadow Throne also continues with this trend, and is a fantastic ending to the trilogy. In the third book, everything from the previous two culminates with an all-out war between the lands, and Jaron is stuck in the middle. Originally, The Shadow Throne was supposed to be the final book, and is a fitting and satisfying end to the series. In fact, I would have been perfectly fine with it ending with the third. Regardless, last year, The Captive Kingdom was published.

In The Captive Kingdom, the inevitable happens, and the series somewhat falls apart. To be honest, it

really isn't a good book. While Nielson continues as a good author, the plot struggles to match up to the rest of the trilogy, and almost all the characters (other than Jaron) become unlikeable. It's one of those books that are hard to read, and never drew me in like the previous three did. Moments of fun in the book are scarce, which is a stark contrast to the first three. Not only that, the main twist of the book was extremely predictable. However, the main issue I have with the book is the major retcon it does to the series. which is somewhat detrimental to the enjoyment of the first three books. Due to all this, it is the only book in the series which I didn't enjoy reading. Nonetheless, it is worth the read, only due to how good The Shattered Castle

In The Shattered Castle, Nielsen makes up for The Captive Kingdom, writing another story that is up to the caliber of the original trilogy. The characters are once again likeable, the main twist is actually quite surprising, and the plot is amazing. Much like the original three (and unlike the fourth), it was difficult to put this book down. It is also a fitting end to the series, and feels much like the third, ending with a sense of satisfaction and finality. As such, while the fourth isn't nearly as good a book as the others, it is worth the read to get to the fifth.

In conclusion, the Ascendance Series by Jennifer A. Nielsen is definitely worth the read, and I cannot recommend it highly enough.

On November 5th, 2021, Marvel released its newest addition to the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU), Eternals. The film stars Gemma Chan (Sersi), Richard Madden (Ikaris), Kumail Nanjiani (Kingo), Lia McHugh (Sprite), Brian Tyree Henry (Phastos), Lauren Ridloff (Makkari), Barry Keoghan (Druig), Ma Dong-seok (Gilgamesh), Kit Harrington (Dane Whitman), Salma Hayek (Ajak), and Angelina Jolie (Thena). The film is directed by Chloé Zhao.

Despite unfavourable reviews from many critics, with around 48% on Rotten Tomatoes at the time of release, the film still made \$161.7 million globally on its opening weekend. Since then, that figure has increased to \$368.4 million globally, surpassing its \$200 million budget. Eternals also marks a couple of firsts for Marvel, including Marvel's first openly gay superhero, Phastos, which has unfortunately led to some controversy, and their first deaf character, Makkari, whose actor (Lauren Ridloff) is also deaf.

Before discussing the plot and film itself, it's important to note that there may be some minor spoilers, so a quick spoiler warning is needed. I would suggest skipping to the end if

you want to go into the movie knowing nothing about it.

SPOILER ALERT

Eternals follows a superhuman race of people who come from the planet Olympia, when they are sent to Earth in 5000 BC to protect humans from an invasive species called the Deviants. When they eventually complete this mission, the Eternals remain on Earth as protectors of humans, albeit with differing opinions among the group on whether or not humans deserve to be protected. Eventually, the group is drawn back together when one of them dies, leading them to believe the Deviants have returned. While this is confirmed to be true, the group, now led by Sersi, quickly learns that there is a much greater threat to humanity than just the Deviants. Fights with both the Deviants and amongst themselves ensue, leading to an eventual climax, both in action and emotion. In Marvel's signature end credits scene, they tease larger things that are to come in the MCU, with both the Eternals themselves, and another seemingly minor character in the film.

In my opinion, the movie is great, possibly even a top five MCU movie for me. It isn't exactly like a typical Marvel movie. It moves away from the typical formula and status quo

and becomes something very unique among Marvel. To start, the cinematography and directing are stunning, absorbing you into the world and character struggles that progress throughout the movie. The movie has great character development, allowing most of the characters in a large ensemble cast to go through well-defined change and progression. Fantastic character arcs, combined with actors who do an amazing job all throughout the movie, helps the audience to care about and connect with the characters. Lastly, on top of the great portrayal of characters, the action is very well done. It flows seamlessly with the drama, and as usual with Marvel, looks great.

With character great development, an incredible twist, amazing acting, and much more, Eternals is definitely worth the watch. Altogether, I'd give it a 8.5/10. For me, it's a top tier Marvel movie, and just a great movie overall.
