To us, all of our Shriners Hospitals for Children patients and their families are *Rising Stars*. We are proud to support the availability of adaptive and assistive technology to help them achieve their goals and live full, satisfying and productive lives.

Examples of devices can range from items to help learn or regain the ability to walk, computer-driven augmentations for those with speech difficulties and items that help children learn to feed or dress themselves. We can also customize devices to fit the specific needs of patients.

Examples of assistive devices that promote self-esteem and independence:

- Custom-made cutlery for children with a unique hand or limb
- Devices to assist with dressing or grooming for children with limited use of upper extremities
- Devices to assist with opening jars, cans, etc. for those with limited hand strength or flexibility
- Adaptive vehicles that allow our patients to "ride alongside" their non-disabled friends
